

Pastor's Note



As I look back on 2025, I am filled with gratitude for the ways this congregation lived the Gospel with courage, tenderness, and joy. This was a year of compassion in motion — a year when you showed up for one another, for our neighbors, and for strangers who quickly became family.

Our theme, "Go and Do the Same," became more than a stewardship message. You lived it in the meals served at The Banquet, the backpacks packed for individuals reentering the community, the coats and Christmas gifts donated to families in need, and the food collected for hungry families. You lived it in the welcome extended to Ukrainian families seeking safety. You lived it in the ways you prayed, volunteered, gave, and encouraged one another through seasons of joy and seasons of strain.

This year also brought honest challenges. Rising costs stretched our budget. The weight of national and global conflict touched many hearts. And yet, even in these realities, I witnessed resilience, creativity, and a deep commitment to being a church where all are welcomed, affirmed, accepted, and loved.

Our ministries flourished in meaningful ways. Children and youth deepened in service and community, including a summer trip to Montana. Adults engaged in spiritual formation and a stress management series. We partnered with Lutheran Church of the Cross for Vacation Bible School and the Block Party, where more than 120 neighbors gathered for connection and joy. And throughout the year, worship grounded us — from youth-led Lenten services to the beauty of Christmas Eve candlelight.

Hope is not wishful thinking; it is a practice. And this congregation practices hope beautifully. I saw it in the children running forward for Time with Children, in the choir's harmonies, in the hands partaking in communion, and in the quiet acts of care that never make it into a newsletter but change lives all the same.

As we enter 2026, we carry both gratitude and responsibility. We are called to deepen our welcome, practice God's love, support our neighbors, and continue advocating for compassion in our community and beyond. We will need creativity, courage, and one another — and we will need God's grace, which is abundant.

Thank you for your trust, your partnership, your humor, your honesty, and your unwavering commitment to being a church where love is not only spoken but lived. It is a blessing to serve as your pastor.



Accepting and Loving One Another



At Bismarck UCC, acceptance and love aren't just values we talk about — they're experiences people name again and again.

When new members joined this year, they told us things like, *"The moment we sang the 'No Matter Who' song, we knew we were in the right place,"* and *"I have been accepted so warmly — this church feels like family to me."* One member shared that after searching for a church where she could be fully herself, she finally found a home here. Another said simply, *"I enjoy this church and how kind everyone is to one another."*

This year, that kindness showed up in countless ways. Our Called to Care team of eight offered prayer, presence, and companionship to members and friends and our Deacons offered words of love in regular cards. As a congregation, we held one another through diagnoses, surgeries, and seasons of uncertainty. We welcomed old friends who returned for visits and embraced new friends who found their way into our community. On Mental Health Sunday, we named aloud the truth that caring for our minds and spirits is holy work, creating space for honesty, healing, and hope.

In the coming year, may we continue to be a community where every person — no matter who they are or where they are on life's journey — is welcomed, affirmed, accepted, and loved.

- The entire neighborhood is invited to grow in faith and friendship every year at our **Vacation Bible School, Block Party, and Ecumenical Worship**.

Creating Space for Transformation



On behalf of Trustees, thank you to everyone for your support of Bismarck United Church of Christ in 2025, from volunteering on cleanup days to providing financial support and sharing your time and talents.

After an especially busy 2024 with church building upgrades and repairs, 2025 required fewer draws on our Building Fund. We resealed and restriped the parking lot through a local contractor but were able to complete most other building updates with volunteer efforts. Trustees spent time this past year updating our maintenance records and creating a manual with details about building operations. This will help us stay on top of building issues and ensure our space is safe and welcoming for everyone.



We began the transition to new, integrated membership and financial software that should provide operational efficiencies while reducing costs. We appreciate the work of everyone who is part of this process and the extra effort to complete the transition.



Regarding church financials, the good news is we ended 2025 with a surplus, the third year in a row we have accomplished this as an organization. Most of the surplus was an increase in dedicated funds, such as contributions to the UCY Fund, Deacons Fund, and Building Fund. These restricted dollars support our youth, our community, and our church building, helping us to meet these important needs going forward. As we look ahead to 2026, expenses are increasing for our church as they are for families and businesses, and we are budgeting a small deficit for next year.



Thank you for your contributions to Bismarck United Church of Christ. Your investment in our shared vision enables us to maintain our physical space, compensate our dedicated staff, and fund our mission work to support each other and our community.

Two meals were sponsored and served at the Dream Center during the year. The Youth Group helped with serving the fall meal and they want to be of service in this way again! Fellowship was enjoyed during the food preparation and serving of the meals. We also support the Food Pantry at the Dream Center with food donations.

We added a twist to our fall meal by hosting a German Supper. We gathered to learn how to make fleischkuekle, on a large scale! Family recipes were shared for the food prepared as well as many memories shared about German meals prepared with our families. There was a good attendance at the meal and good conversation at the tables as we shared a meal. We discovered that many of us shouldn't refer to ourselves as Germans from Russia but as Ukrainians! Our extra food from the supper was shared with Ministry on the Margins as well as half of the proceeds from the German Supper.

Our Stewardship Drive theme of Go and Do the Same was selected to tie in with the lectionary leading up to Consecration Sunday. The sharing of stories of the community outreach of our church fits easily with the Go and Do the Same message. We continue to support the East Timor Education Fund and the 5-for-5 offerings of the national UCC of Our Church's Wider Mission, One Great Hour of Sharing, Strengthen the Church, Neighbors in Need, and the Christmas Fund.

In 2026, we welcome you to look for ways that you can be involved in the outreach of service and stewardship our church family provides.

2024 Annual Meeting Minutes

Held on 02 February 2025.

Moderation Carly Retterath called the meeting to order. A quorum was established by the clerk. Carly led us in an opening prayer. Minutes were reviewed and a motion and a second were made to approve the minutes. The minutes were approved by a voice vote.

Carly provided us with the Moderator’s report. Notable events included: Regional Youth Event, Buffalo Supper, Block Party, The first annual bowling tournament, Splash pad party. Changes have been made to the church’s sabbatical policy for the pastor. The new policy will allow for one month per year over a three-year period for sabbatical. Carly expressed her gratitude and extended a sincere thank you to all who serve on standing and special events committees and all others who volunteer for the church.

Pastor Gretchen Deeg provided her report. She thanked those who dressed for the Groundhog Day theme for the meeting and it appears the consensus is more winter, with a plethora of conversation among meeting attendees. There was a learning opportunity entitled Skills for Bridging the Gap – crossing cultural divides that was offered. It was an ecumenical event with several different congregations from different denominations participating. The Youth Event was held at Rock Island with 16 kids from the Northern Plains Conference in attendance. The NPC had the second largest contingency at the event. The church continues to face challenges finding accompanists and the search will continue. If anybody knows of people who may be interested, they should let Pastor Gretchen or a member of the Music Committee know. Pastor Gretchen thanked Craig DeVos for his commitment to the church’s music ministry and as our choir director. Pastor Gretchen also thanked those who serve on committees and special groups. The printed annual report evolved to include more pictures and more concise reports. A color version is available online at the church’s website. Hannah Vanorny and Pastor Gretchen are delegates to the 2025 UCC General Synod. Pastor Gretchen is serving as the current chair of the conference. Our conference minister, the Rev. Deborah Blood, will be retiring this year. The conference is searching for a permanent conference minister.

Dana Jahner, chair of the Board of Trustees, presented the financial report and the proposed 2025 church budget. We came out of 2024 with a budget surplus, largely due to a generous, one-time gift to the church. The building fund was heavily utilized this year: Updates to the fire suppression system, A new furnace, Paid off special assessments. Dana reported that in-kind time and space was estimated to be at \$144,000. A 2% increase in staff salary is being proposed for 2025. Adjustments were made for compensation for accompanists serving the church. Insurance premiums have increased. The parking lot is in need of work in 2025. The building fund is nearly depleted and we will need to work on increasing that fund. A motion was made and seconded to approve the 2025 budget. The budget was approved by a voice vote.

Monica Klein and Darla Schafer were mentioned as nominees for committees. Their names were not listed in the annual report. The Called to Care Ministry was recognized, but not mentioned in the annual report. Pastor Gretchen installed the new officers and committee members.

Pastor Gretchen led us in a prayer of the church and a closing prayer. The meeting was adjourned.
