A note from our Pastor



"Hear, O Israel: The LORD your God, the LORD is one. Love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength." Deut. 6:4-5

The Hebrew goes even deeper than the English and paraphrased says, "Love God with your emotions and intellect, your body and soul, and all your strength, and if this list missed something, love God with that too." I believe this is what Bismarck United Church of Christ strove to do in 2023. We added new activities like the Buffalo Supper, Paint Parties, Heritage Center tour, Christmas Fair, and others, not because we wanted to be busy, but because we were seeking more opportunities to love one another. This was the year when our hearts wanted to laugh together, hold one another in times of grief, sit and share story after story, serve side-by-side, and let the whole neighborhood and city know God's love.

Some of the motivation behind this year was facing the residual grief built up during the COVID-19 shutdowns and continuing to reclaim new life. However, I think most of the spiritual motivation behind this year was grounded in the past experiences of our members receiving love from this community and wanting to share that love in each of our unique ways with everyone we could. There have been hardships this past year: we need a new roof, we said our final goodbyes to some long-time members, the Afterschool Place closed due to staffing shortages, and expenses increased. But we have also seen God's blessings in many ways: we welcomed new members and friends, celebrated baptisms and confirmations, received generous donations and grants, received the "Certificate of Safe Space" award from Dakota Outright, expanded our partnerships with other churches and organizations, and celebrated our 69th birthday. Most importantly, I have witnessed huge growth in the faith and love of so many of you.

As we look forward to 2024, we'll continue to carry our grounding in God's love as we tell our stories and invite others into this incredible community of faith. Thank you for being light, salt, and love in the Bismarck-Mandan area!

A note from our Moderator



As we wind down 2023, I have been reflecting on what a great year it has been for the Bismarck/Mandan United Church of Christ! This year was filled with increasing church attendance, the re-establishment of many church activities, and growth in community outreach. Below I highlight just a few of the great things that took place this year.

A major focus for church council over this past year was to re-establish a community partner to fill the hole left by Charles Hall Youth Services. Two organizations seemed to naturally fall into place through this process, Ministry on the Margins and CATCH. Our partnership with Ministry on the Margins led to one of the most exciting events to make a re-appearance this year, the Buffalo Supper. The Stewardship Committee did an outstanding job of planning and carrying out this event. Being able to partner with Ministry on the Margins not only with a financial donation from the proceeds but also through the food itself was a powerful experience for many. As a church we look forward to a continued partnership with them.

Another exciting community partnership that happened in 2023 was Bismarck/Mandan UCC officially becoming a member of CATCH (Communities Acting Together for Change and Hope). CATCH has a mission to bring refugees to rural North Dakota to be settled, which can help address the workforce shortages that many communities are experiencing. This is exciting work that we look forward to continuing to be a part of.

I would like to take time to thank Pastor Gretchen for her continued leadership and service to our congregation. I would also like to thank all of our Committee Chairs and Clerk for making council a productive and positive group. Being moderator has allowed me to get to know congregation members in a deep and meaningful way. I feel lucky to be a part of this church and the talented people that call it home.

Finally, as many of you know we continue to struggle with a deficit budget and the ever-increasing costs to operate. As I noted above, this congregation does vital work in our community as well as providing a church home to many. If we want to continue to be able to have the impact, we do and to grow, we must meet our budget deficit head on. Over the next year we will be asking church committee and congregation members to come up with creative fundraising ideas, prayerfully consider their monthly tithing, explore expanded use of the church building and anything else that will help to get us back to where we need to be. I truly believe that this church can meet that challenge, but it will take us all. God bless,

2022 Annual Meeting Minutes

Moderator Carly Retterath called the meeting to order. The Clerk confirmed there was a quorum. The moderator opened the meeting with a prayer. Bill Patrie moved to approve the minutes of the 2021 Annual Meeting, seconded by Wanda Benson.

2022 HIGHLIGHTS

We watched a video Pastor Deeg put together presenting our church year in pictures and song.

- Our in-person worship attendance increased and our online worship views increased by 6%
- Our summer programming was very successful this year.
 - A pool party was held at the Mandigo residence in July
 - We teamed up with Lutheran Church of the Cross for Vacation Bible School
 - The Highland Acres Block Party we held partnering with Lutheran Church of the Cross was again well received
- Autumn Eisenbraun was hired as the church's Administrative Assistant
- We partnered with the Afterschool Place which is going well and is a great outreach
- Our Sunday school numbers are the highest they have been since COVID began
- The Confirmands shared their favorite parts of the past year. Addison Weil: building relationships; Aston Rudy: Christmas caroling; Jet Roth: Christmas caroling; Ella Kraft and Sofia Augustadt: volunteer work.
- Volunteers of the Year Awards were presented to Harold Karch and Lonna Augustadt.

Trustee Dave Archer reviewed our budget. Frank Picard moved that we accept the budget as presented, seconded by Bill Patrie. Budget approved.

The nominations for officers and committee members were accepted and nominees installed.

Pamela Clark Stein, representing Stewardship and Missions, met with Threads of Love group earlier in the year and proposed the idea of creating a church quilt. They were very receptive to the idea and sewed a beautiful quilt that was revealed at the meeting.

Stewardship also started a tradition of "The Giving Plate" for the congregation. The purpose of the plate is to pass it on to members of the congregation to brighten their day. The plate should be passed with a gift of food and a card that lets them know you are thinking of them and holding them in prayer. There is a Tree of Life journal that is to be used to document the recipients and track how far it has been passed on during the year. The plate is complete with a plate carrier sewn by Camille Grothier with apples on it representative of the Johnnie Appleseed Prayer. The first recipient of the plate is Teri and Kevin Nitschke.

Pastor Deeg closed the meeting in prayer for our church and congregation in the new year. The meeting was adjourned by our Moderator, Carly Retterath.

We believe God is still-speaking and that means God is never done with the world or with us. Our faith continues to grow with every worship service, every Bible Study, every service project, and every faith-filled interaction in our lives. In 2023, we intentionally grew our faith through weekly studies and service opportunities.

- **Monday Bible Study** studied key Hebrew words and major themes in the Bible.
- **Friday Bible Study** meet weekly to discuss and debate the lectionary readings used in worship.
- **Sunday School** enhanced the weekly Bible readings with arts, crafts, and service projects for our pre-K to 6th grade students.
- **Confirmation and Youth Group** combined into one as our youth of all ages switched from meeting 2 times per month to weekly.
- **HayCreek Ministry** offered monthly services for the residents at HayCreek Lodge and the act of leading worship deepened the faith of our volunteer leaders.
- **Choir** grew their own faith and the faith of our congregation through the gifts of music and an incredibly supportive community.
- **State Archives Tour** was a new addition to our faith life this year as we explored the history of the UCC in the ND State Archives!

Creating Space for Transformation

2023 brought unexpected surprises, both joyful and frustrating. We began the year celebrating our continued relationship with the Afterschool Place, a program for elementary-aged students. However, in September we received the sad news that the program was needing to close due to a lack of staffing.

Determined to ensure our building continued to serve the wider community every day of the week, we invited Communities Acting Together for Change and Hope (CATCH) to rent office space during the week. CATCH supports refugee resettlement in rural communities and began as a dream of the Northern Plains Conference UCC. Bismarck UCC joined CATCH as their first member organization in 2023! We also provided space for Narcotics Anonymous, Book Clubs, Game Nights, ND 4 Ukraine, Birthday parties, family reunions, and other groups who matched our church's mission and vision. We hope to continue to increase our building usage in 2024.

We made upgrades to our outdoor sacred space with the addition of park benches and painted the cross and handrails. Thanks to donors and a grant from Bismarck Eagles, we installed soffit outlets in the back of the church, so we are better prepared for challenging winter conditions.

The weather provided nearly endless challenges to us in 2023. A near record amount of ice jam causing snow in early 2023 and spring/summer hailstorms caused significant damage to our church roof. The cost to replace the entire roof and associated damage is estimated at \$72,000. Finding out that our insurance company will cover almost the entire cost was a Christmas miracle!

Our final challenge was the budget itself. In October, it appeared that we would be ending the year with a \$18,000 deficit. Thanks to our incredible church community we entered 2024 with a \$5,864 surplus! Together, we moved mountains in 2023!

Thank you to all of our donors and volunteers who turned a challenging year into a celebration. Your support is sustaining space for transformation!

- Helped to feed over 1,000 families per week through Jack's Food Pantry and Adopt-a-Block.
- Our youth Tricked or Treated So Others Can Eat and collected food donations from the neighborhood.
- Volunteered two days at Papa's Pumpkin Patch.
- Brought back the Buffalo Supper and donated \$2,438.18 and 100 meals to Ministry on the Margins.
- Sponsored two families at Christmas time through the Giving Tree and Deacon's Fund.
- Began sponsoring two refugee families from Ukraine.
